



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
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Nowhere to Live, Hard The Student Hou

Cork's soaring rents are pushing MTU students to the edge. Here's why it matters — and what needs to change.

Cork has always been a buzzing student city, but in recent years it's become one of the toughest places in Ireland to find a place to live. For students at MTU, the situation is hitting especially hard. The lack of affordable accommodation isn't just about struggling to pay rent, it's about long commutes, mounting stress, and even the risk of students dropping out altogether.

So, how did it get this bad, what does it mean for MTU students, and what can be done about it?

Why Cork Students Are Struggling to Find a Place

The roots of the crisis run deep. Ireland has been underbuilding housing for decades, and students are caught right in the middle of the wider housing shortage. Cork is no exception. Demand has completely outstripped supply, and prices keep climbing.

While shiny new apartment blocks keep popping up, most of them are designed for wealthier students, often international, who can afford to pay €250 or more per week. For the majority of MTU students relying on SUSI or part-time jobs, these options are simply out of reach.

At the same time, traditional digs and shared houses are drying up. Landlords are leaving the rental market, and families who once rented spare rooms are hesitant without proper supports. The result? A brutal scramble for too few affordable places, leaving many MTU students either priced out or forced to make tough compromises.

The Reality for MTU Students

The crisis doesn't just mean higher bills, it's changing the daily reality of what it means to study at MTU.

The commuter grind is now the norm for many. Students are travelling in from Kerry, West Cork, and Tipperary, often leaving home before dawn just to make morning lectures. Hours in cars and on buses add up, draining energy, making it harder to engage on campus, and leaving little time for study or social life.

For those who do find housing in Cork, the financial strain is relentless. Rent is swallowing up grants and wages, forcing students into part-time jobs with long hours that eat into academic work. A course that should be a full-time commitment is increasingly treated like a side hustle just to keep a roof overhead.

And then there's the mental health toll. Not knowing where you'll live, or constantly worrying about money, has become a massive source of stress. Counselling services are seeing the fallout first-hand. The dream of college life; making friends, joining clubs, immersing in learning, feels far away when the basics of security and rest are missing.

MTU as an institution also feels the knock-on effect. Students may think twice about applying if they can't afford to live in Cork. That undermines the university's mission to open doors for students across the South-West, and risks creating a system where only those with financial backing can fully access higher education.

What Needs to Change

It's easy to feel powerless in the face of such a big problem, but solutions are possible. If decisionmakers start treating student housing as a priority, not an afterthought. From the Students' Union perspective, here's what needs to happen:

- Build affordable, on-campus housing. The government must directly fund MTU and other institutions to provide housing that students can realistically afford, not just more "luxury" units.
- Support for digs and host families. With the right incentives and protections, more Cork households could open their doors to students without fear of being exploited or exploiting.
- Better transport for commuters. If students are forced to travel, cheaper fares and improved bus and rail schedules are essential. No student should have to get up at 5am just to make class.
- A united housing strategy. Both MTU and UCC students face the same reality. A city-wide plan involving both universities, local government, and student voices could stop the piecemeal approach.
- Students at the table. Too often, policies are made about students rather than with them. Any strategy that doesn't include student input will fail from the start.

No More Waiting

The student housing crisis in Cork is not a temporary bump in the road, it's a long-building problem that is now shaping the lives of an entire generation. For MTU students, it means more stress, less opportunity, and a daily struggle that threatens to undermine the promise of higher education.

But crises can create momentum. When students organise, campaign, and refuse to accept the status quo, change can follow. The Students' Union will continue to push for immediate relief and long-term solutions. Because without affordable housing, access to education is little more than an empty slogan. MTU students deserve better.

The MTU Accommodation Office assists students in finding a suitable place to live. The service provides information and guidance to students on the accommodation most appropriate to their needs If you would like any information on the student apartments, you can also contact them directly, see mymtu.ie/accommodation for details. The shared lodgings list (digs) is available to all students from early May throughout the academic year and it is updated regularly.

STUDENTS AND FAMILIES SOLD OUT BY THE €3,000 RETURN I By Keith Brown

For the last three years, students and parents had one small win. The student contribution fee — the most expensive in Europe — was cut from €3,000 to €2,000. It wasn't charity. It was survival. Families under pressure from sky-high rents, food bills and energy costs finally caught a break. Now that break is being snatched back, and the contribution is set to jump back over the €3,000 mark.

Let's call it what it is: a betrayal. Students were told the government "had their back" during the cost-of-living crisis. Parents were led to believe the pressure might finally ease. Instead, the rug's been pulled out. That €1,000 wasn't loose change. It was groceries for the semester, it was keeping the car insured for the commute, it was the reason some families could send a second kid to college at all.

For MTU students, the blow is brutal. This is a university where many are first-generation students, commuters, part-timers balancing study with shifts in shops, bars and care homes. When the State and specifically Minister for Minister for Further and Higher Education James Lawless has said that "as things stand" third level students will have to pay €1,000 extra in fees this year compared to last year. This actually means more students working nights instead of sleeping, more stress in exams, more people deferring or dropping out because they just can't afford to keep going.

All of this is landing in the middle of a housing crisis that has Cork and Kerry students couch-surfing, commuting crazy distances, or paying through the nose for cramped rooms. Living costs are spiralling, SUSI grants don't touch the sides, and now families are being told to cough up another grand every single year. Parents who thought the State was finally beginning to get it feel duped. And they're right.

This isn't just a row about fees. It's about who gets to go to college at all. Every time the government hikes costs, it slams the door on someone who could have been the first in their family to get a degree. It slams the door on the future nurses, teachers, and engineers this country is crying out for. And it weakens regional universities like MTU that are meant to widen access and power local communities.

Here's the truth: if we let this slide, nothing changes. The government will happily take the cash and shrug off the fallout. That's why students and families need to get loud, right now. Talk to your local TDs and tell them straight how this hits your household. Keep an eye out for Students' Union campaigns. Sign petitions, show up, make noise. Politicians move when pressure builds, not when people stay quiet.

We had a glimpse of what fairer fees could look like. That €2,000 contribution showed that change is possible. To rip it away now is nothing short of selling students and parents out. If we want affordable education in Ireland, we're going to have to fight for it — together, loudly, and relentlessly.

n previous Flying Columns, I've written about my doubts over Oasis ever getting back together. But when the chance came to buy tickets last summer, my '90s music heroes had their shot at proving me wrong. Two tickets popped up on Ticketmaster; I grabbed them instantly, with hotel and time off work already pencilled in. That settled it—I called my old college mate Ben Henry (famous in MTU Societies back in the day), and the plan was on.

In the week leading up to it, I went full nostalgia mode: Oasis blasting on repeat and

even digging out footage of my 18-year-old self singing Wonderwall for the Six-One News cameras outside Páirc Uí Chaoimh in '96 (yes, the YouTube link still exists-I'm the one in the bandana at 00:19).

Dublin Bound

Fast forward 29 years and a day later-Saturday morning, August 16th, 2025. Ben and I hopped on the Citylink from Cork to Dublin, arriving by lunchtime. A quick DART brought us to Ballsbridge and the plush Clayton Hotel,

> packed with fans in freshly-bought Oasis tees and floppy hats. Me? I stuck to an old favourite tee, flat cap, and a vintage '96 shirt stashed in the bag as my secret qiq talisman.

before heading into town for a few pints in Mulligan's. While some pubs had Oasis-themed DJ nights and tribute acts, Mulligan's—journalist haunt and Dublin classic—offered what we really needed: pints, seats, and no hassle.

Croker Awaits

By 18:30 the pilgrimage to Croke Park began, the streets buzzing with fans and bootleg merch hawkers. Our seats—Hogan Stand, upper tier, back row—turned out to be a sweet spot: full view of stage, easy access to pints and toilets, and a quick getaway route.

Richard Ashcroft kicked things off with Bitter Sweet Symphony, still as spine-tingling as ever. Then Luke Kelly's Auld Triangle rang out, a signal that history was about to happen.

And then—Oasis. Liam, Noel, Bonehead, Gem, Andy, plus Joey Waronker on drums and Christian Madden on keys, swaggered on to a deafening roar before tearing into Hello. What followed was a masterclass: Acquiesce, Some Might Say, Roll With It, Morning Glory, Cigarettes & Alcohol (complete with a crowd-wide Poznan), and the goosebump-

inducing singalongs of Wonderwall and Don't Look Back in Anger.

Ben lapped it all up, while I went hoarse belting every lyric—only ducking out mid–Slide Away for emergency chips. By the end, I'd scored a tour shirt and a night of memories. Post–gig, we snagged the DART back, capped the night with last orders, and filled Insta with stories.

Morning After Glory

Sunday was all recovery mode: cappuccinos, croissants, and a full Irish before catching the bus south. Back in Macroom, the questions flew—was it worth it? Absolutely. More than a band, Oasis are a state of mind. Roll on Live '26.

What's the Story, Economy?

Oasis Live '25 didn't just shake Croker—it pumped an estimated €2bn into the Irish economy. From hotels and bars to buses and bootleg stalls, everyone cashed in. Fans even spotted Bonehead and Joey Waronker sea-swimming at the Forty Foot, while Liam was seen at Powerscourt and Noel having a pint in Maynooth—signing autographs like proper working-class heroes

who've never lost the run of themselves.

The Sunday night crowd outside Croker—thousands without tickets—turned the streets into a second gig. Half the World Away floated out as a DART train rolled past in slow motion, captured by Big Brother Recordings and broadcast on RTÉ News. Even the signlanguage interpreter in the PRM/disabled section went viral for her full-throttle signing of Morning Glory. Representation never looked so rock 'n' roll.

Trad's Not Dead

One last note. The roar of Luke Kelly's Auld Triangle proved how deeply Irish crowds still cherish trad. With Oasis's own Irish roots and the tricolour flying on stage, it felt right. And it's not just nostalgia: the new trad wave is alive and thriving. From Chasing Abbey mixing trad into dance hits (Oh My Johnny still bangs) to The Mary Wallopers, Kingfishr, Biird, and fresh acts like The Turfmen—Irish trad is evolving without losing its so ul.

Keep your ears open. The next big night out might just be a trad gig. Sláinte.

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
