The Prize for Innovation marked its 25th anniversary this year with a record 113 applications and over 350 students participating across teams and individual entries from MTU's Cork and Kerry campuses of Munster Technological University. The competition continues to showcase the creativity and ambition of MTU students, with projects spanning a wide range of disciplines and developed both through academic modules and independent work.

FROM CAMPUS TO THE GLOBAL STAGE: MTU TEAM WINS HULT PRIZE IRELAND

Electrical engineering student Seán Barrett, co-founder of **ReAble Labs**, has won the Hult Prize Ireland 2026, securing a place in the international stage of one of the world's leading student entrepreneurship competitions.

At ReAble Labs, Seán is working alongside Trinity College Dublin medical student William Hartley to develop affordable, modular bionic hands using robotics and 3D printing to address the global lack of access to prosthetic devices.

Seán Barrett said, "Over 50,000 teams applied this year from universities around the world, and now just 55 remain. We're one of them, and one step closer to the \$1 million prize. ReAble Labs is focused

on building an affordable, modular prosthetic hand for the people who need it most. There are 57 million people living with limb loss, over 80% in developing nations, and fewer than 20% ever receive a prosthetic. That's the problem we're trying to solve."

Following their national success, ReAble Labs will now join 60 teams worldwide competing for the \$1 million Hult prize and representing Ireland on the global stage.

Another MTU team, **MaternaGuard**, also reached the top six at this year's national final, highlighting the strength of student innovation and entrepreneurship across the University.

The Travel Health Checks You Shouldn't Skip

Mark had everything sorted. Flights booked. Bags packed. Passport checked more times than he could count. By the time he arrived at the airport, he was already mentally on holiday.

But as he sat at the departure gate, listening to the chatter around him, one question caught his attention: “Did you need vaccines for this trip?” Mark paused.

It wasn't something he'd thought about. In fact, beyond the basics, he hadn't given much consideration to his health or safety at all. Like many travellers, he assumed that once the logistics were in place, the rest would take care of itself. It doesn't.

The Things You Don't Think About—Until You Have To

Like many travellers, Mark assumed that if a destination was popular, it must be safe. But what he didn't realise was that measles cases have been rising globally, and protection isn't guaranteed unless you've had two doses of the MMR vaccine or had measles in the past.

It's a small detail, until it isn't. A quick check before travelling can make all the difference. Knowing your

vaccination status and reviewing what's recommended for your destination isn't overkill, it's basic preparation.

Check out “NaTHNaC” website to review specific vaccines recommended for your destination and malarial zones. If possible book an appointment at a travel health centre at least 6-8 weeks prior to travel.

“I'll Be Grand” Isn't a Plan

Mark had a minor health condition. Nothing serious. He packed what medication he had left and assumed it would be enough.

Halfway through the trip, it wasn't.

What could have been a simple GP visit before departure turned into a stressful search in an unfamiliar place, navigating language barriers and different healthcare systems.

If you have any ongoing medical condition, even a well-managed one, it's worth checking in with your GP before travelling. Ensuring you're fit to travel and bringing enough medication (plus a little extra) can save a lot of hassle.

The Small Habits That Matter More Abroad

At home, you don't think twice about food, water, or hygiene. Abroad, those everyday habits suddenly matter more. Mark tried everything - street food, local drinks, ice in every glass. It was all part of the experience...until it wasn't.

A few simple precautions can go a long way:

- Practice good hand and respiratory hygiene
- Be mindful of food and water safety
- Take steps to avoid insect bites

Sun, Safety, Situational Awareness

The weather was perfect. Too perfect. Like many people, Mark underestimated the sun. Long days outdoors without proper protection quickly led to sunburn that lingered longer than the memories.

Add in late nights, a bit too much alcohol, and unfamiliar surroundings, and the risks start to stack up.

Simple measures make a difference:

- Avoid peak sun hours (11am – 3pm)
- Wear a hat and sunglasses
- Use sunscreen correctly
- Be mindful of alcohol and drug use

And while it's not always top of mind, practising safe sex and using protection is just as important when travelling as it is at home.

When Things Don't Go to Plan

It happened on day five. Mark reached for his passport—and it wasn't there. What followed was a stressful scramble. Who do you call? Where do you go? What's the process?

He realised too late that he hadn't looked into what support was available or how to access help from Irish services abroad.

And then there was the issue of insurance - something he'd considered "optional." It's not.

Travel Smart, Travel Well

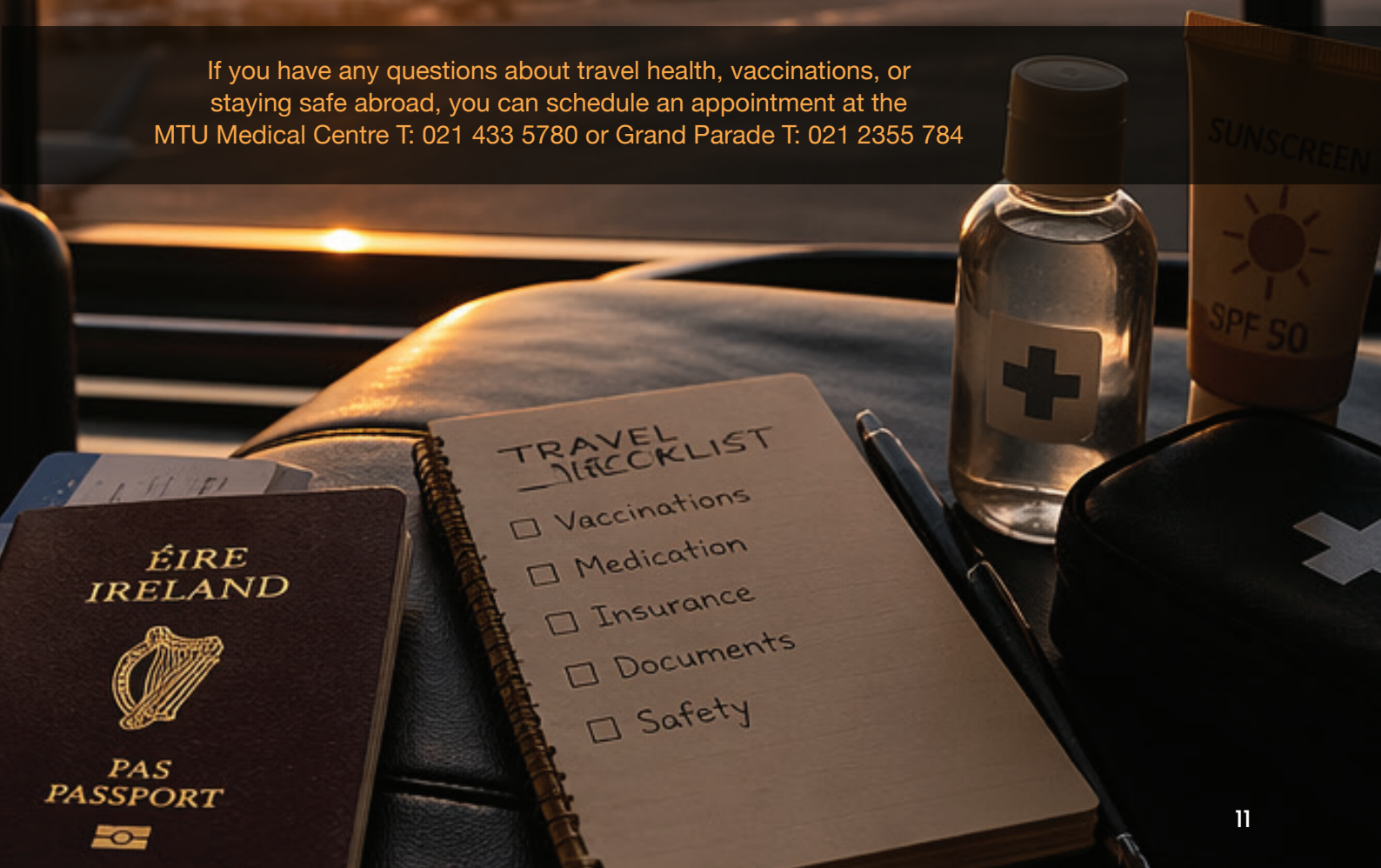
Getting away should be about switching off—not dealing with problems that could have been prevented.

A few simple checks before you travel can make all the difference:

- Make sure your vaccinations, including MMR, are up to date
- Check what's recommended for your destination
- Review safety advice and entry requirements
- Arrange comprehensive travel insurance
- If you have a medical condition, speak with your GP
- Bring enough medication for your trip
- Know what to do if your passport is lost or stolen

Taking a little time to prepare means you can focus on what really matters - enjoying your trip.

RUNNING ON EMPTY

The world feels like it's running a little too close to the edge right now, and a lot of that comes back to oil. A fresh global squeeze, sparked by rising tensions in the Middle East and disruption through critical shipping routes, has once again exposed how dependent we are on something we can't fully control.

And then it hits home.

Across Ireland, frustration has spilled out onto the roads. Farmers, hauliers, contractors, people who literally keep the country moving, have slowed it down instead. Blockades, go-slows, and protests have turned daily commutes into gridlock and brought parts of the country to a standstill. Petrol shortages, something most students would associate with the 1970s, are suddenly part of real life again.

The government has responded in the usual way: cut a bit here, subsidise a bit there. It might take the sting out short-term, but no one's pretending it fixes the

bigger issue. What's more striking is the shift in attitude. Ireland isn't quite the "sure it'll be grand" nation it once was. People are pushing back harder, louder, and more visibly, taking a page from the likes of France when it comes to protest culture.

At the same time, there's a line being drawn. The anger is about cost of living, not about feeding political extremes. Most people know exactly what they're protesting, and what they're not.

For students, it's not abstract. It's pricier buses, more expensive trips home, summer holidays hanging in the balance, and the real possibility of grounded flights if fuel shortages deepen. But there's an uncomfortable contradiction sitting underneath it all: we're desperate for more access to oil...while knowing full well it's part of what's driving the climate crisis we're inheriting. It's not just an energy crisis. It's an identity one.

If the global situation feels frustrating, Irish football isn't offering much of an escape.

Another campaign, another collapse. Ireland's playoff loss to Czechia had all the usual ingredients, early promise, a costly mistake, and then that familiar drift into passivity. Concede a goal, lose momentum, and suddenly the game feels out of reach before it actually is.

There are bright sparks. Players like Troy Parrott have given fans something to latch onto again, and the success of the women's

team has shown what Irish football can look like when belief and structure align. But the men's side still feels stuck, waiting for moments instead of creating them.

There's also a sense we've been here before. Pinning hopes on one standout player, expecting them to drag the team forward, echoes older eras that didn't end particularly well. Talent is there, but the mindset hasn't quite caught up.

For a generation of students who've grown up without seeing Ireland at a major tournament, patience is wearing thin. The question isn't whether there's potential, it's why it keeps going unrealised.

Away from the chaos of politics and sport, there's been a quieter but more lasting loss.

Two major figures in Irish music have passed, marking the end of an era that shaped how Irish sound travelled across the world. Moya Brennan, the lead singer of Clannad and Dolores Keane. Their influence wasn't just in the music itself, but in how they fused tradition with something modern, something that could sit comfortably on global stages without losing its roots.

For a student audience raised on streaming and algorithm-driven playlists, it's easy to overlook where that sound came from. But without those pioneers, a lot of what defines Irish music today simply wouldn't exist.

Their legacy isn't just worth remembering, it's worth revisiting. An Dheis De Go Raibh Na hAnam Dhillis Moya agus Dolores. Agus Go Raibh Mile Maith Agaibh. Ye will truly be missed.

And before the academic year wraps up, there's at least one thing delivering exactly what you want from a break: sharp writing, dark humour, and a heavy dose of nostalgia.

Lisa McGee has struck gold again with 'How To Get To Heaven From Belfast', now streaming on Netflix. What starts as a story about three women reconnecting quickly spirals into something much darker, as they dig into the disappearance of a former friend and uncover secrets that refuse to stay buried.

It's chaotic, funny, and just the right amount of unhinged. Add in a soundtrack stacked with early-2000s hits, and it hits that sweet spot between comfort and tension.

If you need something to switch your brain off after exams, but still keep you hooked, this is it.

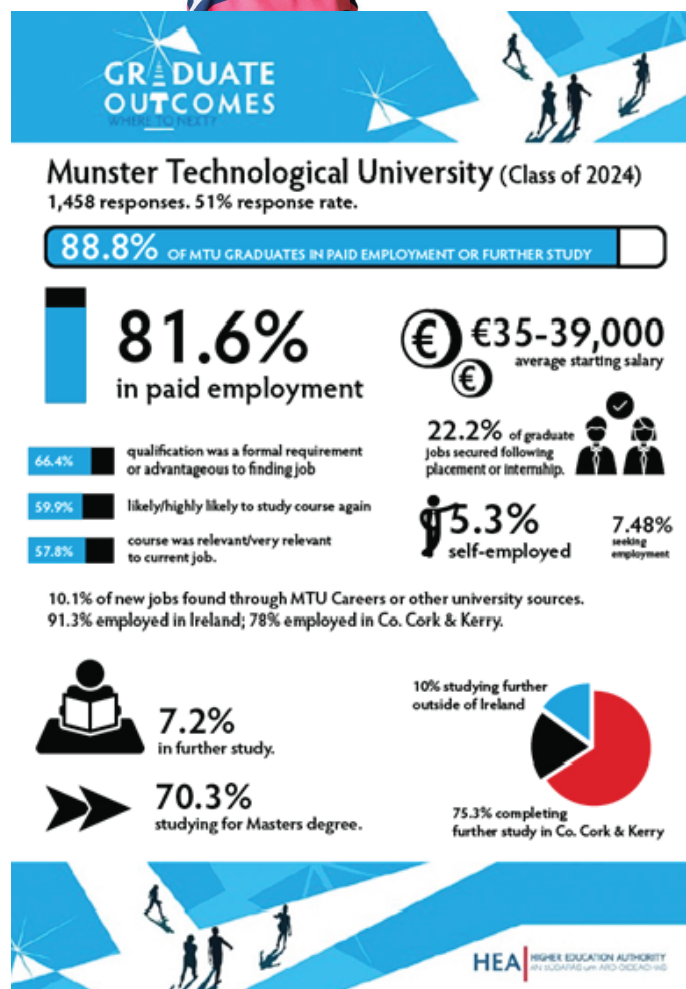
